From the Director

Changes. They happen and, we hope, are for the better. Over the summer, library staff worked on a Barriers to Service Report. As a result, the Library District has implemented the following changes, with more to



come! Our hope is that what may have once been a library-use barrier to you may no longer exist.

No more fines! After careful analysis and discussion, the Board of Trustees voted in June to eliminate fines for overdue materials and unclaimed holds. Unreturned materials will continue to be billed to the borrowing patron and unpaid bills will continue to be referred to collections.

Library Card Registration: In recognition of the difficulties some parents or guardians may have in getting to the library to complete a library card registration form for younger patrons, we have introduced a limited-use card, which will be issued to youths under 18 without parental sign-off. This card may only have 3 items checked out at a time and may be upgraded to a full-use card when a guardian comes into the library and completes the full registration process.

Early Childhood Programs: With the pandemic more under control, we dropped the registration requirement for early childhood programs. We may still ask for participants to provide contact information upon arrival, so we can conduct contact tracing if need be. Programs that use consumables (like those that have a craft) will still require registration so staff can be prepared with enough supplies.

Log In! Library District patrons will have a richer experience if they log in to their library account when searching the online catalog, or search any of our streaming or download services.

For the Library District, these changes are pretty big. Bear with us as we implement them! This issue of *The Rotunda* has more of the great programs your public library staff have created and curated. Enjoy them as we move into the "pumpkin spice" season!

A reminder! The Library District's annual budget vote and trustee election will be held on General Election Day **(November 8)** and on the General Election ballot.

Black Life in America



The Poughkeepsie Public Library District has acquired access to a new online database, *Black Life in America: The Experience and Impact* of African Americans as Recorded by the News Media, 1704 to Today. Black Life in America is a credible

resource database for community members to utilize in their research, whether for academic or personal purposes. Along with the opening of our Sadie Peterson Delaney African Roots Branch Library, these resources aid in the direction the Library District is taking to better represent its community members.

"This primary source collection offers an expansive window into centuries of African American history, culture and daily life—as well as the ways the dominant culture has portrayed and perceived people of African descent. The content in this database is sourced from more than 19,000 American and global news sources, including over 400 current and historical Black publications. This source covers a timeline from the early 18th century to the present day. An easy-to-use online resource—updated daily—for every institution working toward social justice and racial equity."



The Big Read



Think back to when you were young, to the books you embraced as you came to define yourself as a reader. For many of us, staking out space in the corner of a library or reading with a flashlight under the covers, reading provided an escape from the real world into adventures that test the limits of possibility.

This year, the Big Read centers on short stories, the kind that invite us to explore new and fantastical worlds some very much like ours, some radically different. Fitting the "spooky season" peaking at Halloween, many of these stories dip into genres like gothic horror, science fiction, and fantasy—precisely the kind of stories that turn many children into readers.

The 2022 Big Read flagship title is *Pretty Monsters* by Kelly Link, a prolific short story writer and founding copublisher of Small Beer Press. Link's work crosses genre and literary fiction, striking a rare balance between the divisoral publishers and the rebelliourness of normalize functions like Stanham King and Shiday Jackson

respectability of traditional publishers and the rebelliousness of popular favorites like Stephen King and Shirley Jackson.

"You don't pick up a ghost story because you think it's going to be important. You pick it up because you think it's going to make you feel a certain way," Link said in a 2018 interview on her MacArthur Fellowship. "It's going to maybe give you shivers down your back, or it's going to raise your hair a little bit, or it's going to make you feel mildly creeped out."

Kelly Link will present an author talk at Boardman Road Branch Library on **Saturday, November 12 at 2:30 pm.**

Leading up to Link's talk, the Big Read comprises a festival of events designed to enhance readers' understanding and enjoyment of the book. A concert of horror movie music, a mini-festival of scary short films, graveyard tours, and lectures on influential figures from Edgar Allan Poe to Buffy the Vampire Slayer await you!



You can be a writer!

Have you ever wanted to try writing a story? Many people feel a sense of curiosity about the art of writing fiction, but they might not know where to start. With plenty of programs and books specifically designed to support writers, your library can help with that!

You might want to become a published author, or you might just want to write for yourself. Either way, writing fiction, like any other art form, has immeasurable benefits to your well-being. Creativity is a great way to work out your brain. Creative writing is even linked to the alleviation of depression in some people. It strengthens communication, organizational, and research skills, and it can be very rewarding to watch yourself improve as your perseverance pays off.

Word Count Guide for Writers

Flash Fiction: 500 words and under Short Story: about 500 - 10,000 words Novella: 10,000 - 49,999 words Novel: 50,000 words and above

Any story can be a great story, so word count is not an indicator of quality. For example, Edgar Allan Poe believed that short stories were ideal because they could be read from start to finish in one sitting.

A great way to get started writing a story is by giving yourself permission to explore something that has intrigued you, like a "what if?" question or a character you think has an interesting perspective or personality. You might find, as you continue to develop your plot and characters and maybe even a whole new world, that you are passionate and excited about your new project!

November is National Novel Writing Month (or NaNoWriMo for short), when writers attempt to write 50,000 words in 30 days! Why 50,000 words? Because that is the threshold at which a story becomes a novel. It might seem like a big commitment, but thousands of writers around the globe succeed at NaNoWriMo, and even those who don't quite reach 50,000 words finish with a sense of accomplishment because they have created something they can build on later.


