Youth Services Survey

Throughout 2023, the Library District will seek public input on the services in various programmatic areas. This survey, focusing on Youth Services, is the first in a series designed to provide input for planning services that respond to local community interests and needs.

Q1: The Library District offers a variety of programs, services, and collections, in print and through streaming, for youth and families. Currently, we provide services in the following areas:

- Early Childhood (Birth Pre-K): In-person story times for infants and parents, toddlers, and preschoolers; sensory workshops; daily streaming of early literacy tools; early literacy backpacks filled with books, puzzles, and literacy tips.
- Elementary Ages (Grades K 5): Book clubs, thematic story and craft programs, STEM activities, tutoring, recreational gaming, and homework support.
- Teens & Middle School Ages (Grades 6 12): Book clubs, craft programs, STEM activities, cooking classes, recreational gaming.
- Outreach: In-library and site-based class visits, and Rover (bookmobile) site visits.






An Afternoon with David Allen Sibley Saturday, April 8, 2:30-4 pm, BRD



Tree ID: Maples

All of these maples, members of the genus *Acer*, live in our community! How many can you find?

Sugar maple (Acer saccharum)

One of our native dominant species, sugar maples have rough bark and their leaves have close to a perfect semicircle between lobes. Their name comes from being the #1 source of syrup.

Red maple (Acer rubrum)

Another prominent native species, young red maples have very smooth bark similar to beech or hornbeam, but it cracks in vertical striations as they age.

Silver maple (Acer saccharinum)

A gorgeous native species that is growing popular as a landscape tree, the silver maple has a finer texture of rough bark than its sugary cousin.

Norway maple (Acer platanoides)

This tree comes from Scandanavia, and became popular here in the '60s and '70s, possibly because it leafs out early and keeps leaves longer than native species. Sadly, however, Norway maples can outcompete

native sugar maples. They have a distinctive furrowed bark texture and a larger, fuller leaf shape.

Japanese maple (Acer palmatum)

This species enjoys a range of leaf styles and colors, and are the maples you'll most commonly see trained to grow in a deliberate shape in someone's garden.







Make a DIY Leprechaun!

Disclaimer: He may be unable to grant wishes. (Typical, we know.)

- 1. Make his **body** out of a green paper tube.
- **2.** Cut a circle out of paper (you can trace the tube for this) for your leprechaun's face.

3. Cut a circle out of green paper, about 3" wide, for the brim of the hat. Trace your tube in the middle of the circle, and cut out the middle.

4. Glue the face onto the tube about $\frac{3}{4}$ " inch from the top. Attach hat brim over this (a little past the top of the face).

5. Make a **beard** with a pipe cleaner or paper; if using a pipe cleaner, curl tightly around a pencil and poke a tiny hole in the tube at either corner where the face meets the hat and push the pipe cleaner through; if using paper, simply glue it on.

6. Wrap a strip of black paper or ribbon around his middle for a **belt**, and do the same over the brim of his hat to make a hatband. Add a buckle to the belt. 7. Use a marker to draw a friendly face!


