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Vision

The Poughkeepsie Public Library District will have vibrant libraries where people want to be. It will meet the needs of a diverse and growing constituency by providing services and partnering with other community organizations. The Board of Trustees and the staff will work together to serve the public and to respond to the changing nature of library services.

Adriance at 125

In June of 1896, a letter was sent to the Poughkeepsie Common Council from one of Poughkeepsie's oldest and most prominent families. The letter declared the family's wish to build a library in memory of their parents, John P. Adriance and Mary Jane Ruthven Platt, owners of Adriance, Platt & Co. The firm, makers of harvesting machinery, was one of Poughkeepsie's major successes, employing more than 1,500 workers during its heyday.

A site on Market Street was selected and submitted to the Adriance family for approval by August of that year, and Charles Frederick Rose was chosen as the architect. A former resident who began his career in Poughkeepsie, Rose's design was conceived in the Italianate style of the Beaux Arts tradition that was so popular at the time. Titus & Round, a Poughkeepsie based contracting firm, was selected to build the structure. The white marble for the exterior came from Adams Marble Company in Adams, MA, and the artificial marble columns and pilasters found in the central lobby were supplied by John Shipway of New York City.

The 23,000- volume collection was moved from the old Poughkeepsie High School location, and for the first time, Poughkeepsie's public library was housed in its own building. The newly completed Adriance Memorial Library was dedicated in a public ceremony on October 18, 1898. The original structure's design, having been restored several times, remains largely intact to this day, though the library has expanded greatly over the years in order to house our current collection of over 160,000 items. **– Kira Thompson**, *Head of Adult Services & Local History*



The Big Read 🛄

The 2023 Big Read flagship title is The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown, the true story of the University of Washington rowing crew who represented the United States at the 1936 Summer Olympics in Berlin, Germany, against the dual historical contexts of the Great Depression and the rise of Nazism.

"I just went looking for the human story inside the sports story... life, struggle and finding the boundary between yourself and a larger purpose," author Brown stated in an interview published in the Seattle Times in 2013. He initially found the story by way of his neighbor, Judy Willman, who introduced him to her father, Joe Rantz. Rantz, then on hospice and a fan of Brown's previous books, had been one of the eight crew members who rowed for the United States in the 1936 Summer Olympics, taking home the gold medal in spite of so much adversity.

According to Brown, during the Great Depression, Joe "had to survive on his own, foraging in the woods for food at times. He became very independent, very strong. And yet crew is the most cooperative sport there is. You cannot row competitively in a 24-inch-wide shell with eight guys rowing at the same time without an extraordinary amount of collaboration and sportsmanship."

Among themes to be celebrated in the Big Read this year are not only water sports, but a broader look at life

along our own Hudson River. Look for thematic programs in this and the November/December issue not only about rowing, but ecology, US and Indigenous histories, art, and so much more. We look forward to seeing members of the community at Big Read events throughout Dutchess County, as well as those coordinated by fellow Dutchess County Libraries, author visits to local schools, and more.

I have a book club, and tutor primary and secondary literacy classes for adults. I also organize educational talks where professionals from the community participate. When I have time, I love to reach out to people and participate in community events and on the radio. This position never gets boring. It has allowed me to grow, learn, and connect with wonderful people who have joined me in various projects.



Read to Succeed!

In early July, the Mid-Hudson Black Child Development Institute (MHBCDI) sponsored the literacy development of local youth through their Read to Succeed program. Students in grades K-8 gathered in St. Paul's Episcopal Church, where PPLD youth services librarians Alison Francis and Liz Asta read books aloud and gave an informal presentation about the wonders of the library. "They brought in every piece of vitality that makes this library hum," stated Nadine Jackson-Ivey, who coordinated the grant that funded Read to Succeed.

Alison and Liz also helped children acquire library cards. Other special guests who participated included teachers from the Poughkeepsie City School District, mayoral candidate Yvonne Flowers, and more. In Nadine's words, the program brings "vitality and engagement to children."

Studies by Scholastic show that every summer, children in grades K-5 lose about 20% of their school year gains in reading and 27% in math. This significant learning loss is known as the "summer slide." Programs like Read to Succeed are a great way to keep children on track when school is closed for the summer and instill in them a continuous love of learning.

Tree ID: Oaks

There are over 600 species of oak, members of the genus *Quercus*, across the world, 90 of which are native to the US. Our native oaks are generally split into categories, each named after a common species (e.g., red or white). Oaks are admired for their size, stateliness, and longevity. In fact, it's said that an oak spends 300 years growing, 300 living, and 300 dying.

Red oak (Quercus rubra)

Red and black oaks can be hard to tell apart, but red oak bark, while furrowed, is usually smoother in texture with pinkish to red-brown undertones. The leaves of red oaks have pointed lobes, typically numbering 7-9 in total. A native cousin of *Q. rubra* is the pin oak (*Q. palustris*).

White oak (Quercus alba)

Members of the white oak group are most easily distinguished by their leaves, which have rounded lobes. Q. *alba* produces an elongated acorn with a shallow cap. However, it has many cousins that are also native to our region, including the chestnut oak (Q. *montana*), the swamp white oak (Q. *bicolor*), and the bur oak (Q. *macrocarpa*).

Black oak (Quercus velutina)

Black oaks are sometimes considered part of the red oak family, but their bark has distinctive square-edged furrows, and their leaves have fewer lobes, usually numbering 5-7. Acorns are generally short with a scaly cap.
