academic institutions. Bill is a past president of the Mid Hudson Rowing Association and a rowing coach.






November 15: The Dutch House by Ann Patchett

A richly moving story that explores the indelible bond between two siblings, the house of their childhood, and a past that will not let them go. This is the last meeting of the year; there is no December meeting.



You may know The Big Read as a chance to meet authors and make new friends while enjoying a good book, but less apparent may be The Big Read's longstanding tradition of providing innovative teacher trainings for educators who plan to teach the book across the Hudson Valley.





First, Bill Jeffway of the Dutchess County Historical Society informed the cultural context for teaching *The Boys In The Boat*, elucidating key ways in which "historical truth" is constructed and in some cases manipulated to erase certain populations. Next, Jeff Urbin of the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library & Museum provided illuminating resources for teaching *The Boys in the Boat's* narrative through understanding the monstrosities of the Holocaust. Marist professors Elizabeth Clarke and Ann Sandri then regaled the audience with tales of Poughkeepsie's past by examining artifacts

from the once world-renowned Poughkeepsie Regatta, which features prominently in the book. Finally, teachers chose between hands-on trainings in generative writing exercises with *The Ekphrastic Writer* by Janée J. Baugher, and multimedia storytelling with The Art Effect, for engaging ways to help students' performance and understanding.

The Big Read is about more than just words on the page. It's an annual opportunity to reinvigorate our teaching practices and reinvest in our collective humanity by helping students draw parallels between the lives they live and those they read about in class. —Mary Ellen Iatropoulos, The Art Effect

Tree ID: Conifers

The class of Coniferophyta contains over 600 species, including cedars, junipers, yews, larches, hemlocks, redwoods, and members of the pine family (Pinaceae), which includes true pines, spruces, and firs. Most but not all members of Pinaceae are evergreen and produce cones full of seeds from September to December.

Pine (Pinus)

Though all members of Pinaceae may be accurately called "pines," true pines are members of the genus Pinus. They are characterized by having clusters of 2-5 long, soft

needles. Species popular in the Hudson Valley include the native white pine (P. alba, shown), the Scots pine (P. sylvestris), and the Japanese black pine (P. thunbergii).

Spruce (Picea)

The needles of spruce trees are distinguishable by their sharp tips and cylindrical form. Their needles, arranged singly (not in clusters), are easy to roll between

your fingers. Locally popular spruces include the native white (P. glauca), black (P. mariana), and red spruces (P. rubens); the Norway spruce (P. abies); and the Colorado blue spruce (P. pungens, shown). They are a favorite hideaway for birds and small mammals, perhaps because of their sharp needles.

Fir (Abies)

Unlike spruce, a single fir needle will not roll in your fingers because they are flat. Fir needles, though also arranged singly, are much softer to the touch. For this reason, they may be a popular wintertime snack

for wildlife. The only species native to our region is the balsam fir (A. balsamea, shown), but other popular species include the Fraser fir (A. fraserii), and the concolor or white fir (A. concolor). Despite its name, the massive Douglas fir of the northwest US (Pseudotsuga menziesii) is not a member of the fir genus at all.

Borrow a Chromebook!

Chromebooks are a great way to do some work or surf the web on the go. If you're in need of a portable way to access the internet, you may borrow a Chromebook from the Circulation Desk at Adriance Memorial Library. Borrowers must be Poughkeepsie Public Library District resident card holders for at least six months, with no fines, and must be over 18 years old. Please keep in mind that a Chromebook does not have internet access on its own, so you'll have to use it in a place where you can log into Wi-Fi (like the library or a local business with Wi-Fi access).

The Chromebooks are part of the Library District's Library of Things collection, an effort to give patrons a chance to borrow items that might not usually be in a library collection, such as musical instruments or a hiking backpack. Patrons can borrow a Chromebook for three weeks, and will be asked to sign an agreement upon check-out. Patrons who are unfamiliar with using portable devices like this can bring the Chromebook to the Computer Lab from 11 am - 1 pm, weekdays, at the Adriance Memorial Library, where staff can assist one-on-one.




