

Library adds on-demand, live phone interpretation service available in 100+ languages

LanguageLink allows library staff and patrons who speak different languages to communicate with the assistance of an interpreter, ensuring greater access to the library's collections, programs, and services.

The Reference Desk on the Main Floor at Adriance is now equipped with a phone that has two handsets. After identifying their language from a chart, patrons can have a three-way communication with a library staff member and an interpreter. The library's LanguageLink service is expected to expand in the upcoming months.

Reference desks at all three PPLD locations are now equipped with Language Link handsets.

Translating the Library Website

PPLD is improving our website with particular attention to the Spanish-speaking community, as part of an ongoing commitment to provide inclusive and accessible resources.

Previously, users could translate the website using the ReciteMe Accessibility Toolbar. However, ReciteMe's main purpose is to provide accessibility to disabled users.

The new Spanish Translation Tool uses AI software to generate translated text, connecting Spanish language users to the website's most up-to-date information. Interns from Marist College's Department of World Languages and Culture assist by reviewing the translations for accuracy, under the direction of Dr. Patricia Ferrer-Medina, Assistant Professor of Spanish at Marist College and member of the PPLD Board of Trustees.

"It's a challenge to make sure it's the most universally comprehensible," said intern Chloe Aznar, a senior at Marist. "There are different dialects, and people from all over are reading the website, and we want to make sure that it's understandable to as many people as possible."

Litzy Ayala, an intern who grew up speaking Spanish, takes a holistic view, considering family dynamics. "Translating is important because otherwise, the kids have to [interpret]," Litzy said. "That can be difficult because the kids don't always know the big words. The translation is important because it takes the pressure off the children, and gives the adults some freedom."

The interns have found it rewarding to help the local community. "I can be involved in the Poughkeepsie Library and help out with the community in Poughkeepsie," said Victoria Buck, an intern double-majoring in Spanish and Italian. She has been auditing the website to determine which online resources from the e-library, such as Gale, Hoopla, or Libby, are accessible in Spanish. Many resources available on the website offer the ability to set Spanish as the preferred language. Victoria creates step-by-step guides on how to access and set the language preferences.



Although the majority of the Library District website has been translated and reviewed, as content is updated, translations will be added. To view the translated site, click on the word "Español" located in the upper-right corner of any page.


