

Staff Spotlight: Angela Panzer

PPLD celebrates an outgoing teen librarian after 18 years of service.

How would you describe your position?

I feel I have the best job ever. Most of my time here, I've been privileged to work with teens and watch them grow from young, bouncing-off-the-walls 12-year-olds, to confident, capable, 18-year-olds. When I started at PPLD, there was only a single bookshelf for teen fiction, and the teens had to share a few adult computers. Teens did not have any place to call their own. I was so happy to contribute and witness the creation of an extraordinary Teen Room and to offer the teens all the services we can to help them become unique individuals. I've worked with both the Youth and Adult Services staff. Part of my job has been working at the

Adult Reference Desk, helping adults find answers to all types of questions. I've spent most of my time working with a very creative bunch from Youth Services. It's been a delightful experience over the years, and I thank them for all their camaraderie and support.

What do you like the most about your job?

Designing programs has been as much fun for me as I hope it has been for the teens. With technology constantly changing, I have continued to try new things with the teens such as 3D printing, virtual reality, and animation. I have shared my love of art with programs on manga drawing, landscape painting, and hosting teen art shows. I enjoyed learning about the Teen Media Lab and bringing innovative programs such as making zines (minimagazines), Photoshop, and film editing to the teens. Our Halloween and summer celebrations got all the teens laughing, eating, and having a fun time. I especially remember the mummy wrap with toilet paper and bobbing for gummy worms in whipped cream, not to mention the Hudson River Sloop *Clearwater* sails, where teens hoisted the sails, steered the sloop, and participated in hands-on river wildlife sampling. I got to know many teens who have moved on to adulthood but still stop by and say hi. The teens have been an amazing group to work with, and I have many fond memories of them. I recall one teen who taught himself to play a musical instrument while using our guitar. Over years of practicing every afternoon in the teen room, he became an amazing guitarist! To all the teens who I crossed paths with - I wish you all the very best in whatever you do!

Can you share a personal fun fact?

I enjoy trying different things, from equestrian riding, to playing racquetball. Currently, I am working to improve my harp playing. I love the sweet sound of the harp but it's quite a challenge for me to use both hands at the same time (but I keep on practicing!). A few years before coming to PPLD, I joined the adult rowing team and learned to row in a crew boat with eight rowers and a coxswain on the Hudson River with the Hudson River Rowing Association. Later, I fulfilled my ultimate goal to row in a single (a single boat has one person using two oars). What a magical time it is out on the river. I want to thank everyone for all their support and encouragement throughout my time here at PPLD. I am wishing the very best to the new Teen Librarians. I hope your journey is as wonderful as mine has been.






