

Black Americans, Civil Rights, and the Roosevelts

On February 9, the Franklin D. Roosevelt Presidential Library and Museum hosted PPLD patrons to tour a new exhibit, "Black Americans, Civil Rights, and the Roosevelts, 1932-1962," with the Supervisory Museum Curator, Herman Eberhardt, who provided historical guidance and background on the Roosevelts.

The exhibit begins during the Great Depression, much like Roosevelt's presidency. "As hard as it was for everybody during the Great Depression, it was even harder for Black people because they had already started from a position of being economically segregated, and [the Depression] made it even worse," Eberhardt explained. "We want people coming into the exhibit to first get a sense of what America was like in 1932." The exhibit showcases the experiences and challenges Black people faced even through the New Deal and into W WII. It continues after the death of FDR, and follows Eleanor's work as an influential figure.

The displays show the progress of civil rights, as Roosevelt entertained Black visitors to the White House and had Black advisors, yet the New Deal still discriminated against Black people.



The Roosevelts had limited contact with Black people prior to 1913, when Roosevelt joined the Woodrow Wilson administration. They then had Black members of their household staff. Even then, as the curator said, "What you're not seeing before 1932 is any real interaction with either of the Roosevelts with African American intellectuals, politicians, people in the middle and upper class." The exhibit shows visitors the results of this, both in making progress, and in failing to gain the amount of progress that many activists were working toward.

All Mid-Hudson Library System cardholders can view the exhibit for free with a museum pass from the library through December 31, 2024. The Presidential Library is located on the Franklin D. Roosevelt National Historic Site in Hyde Park.




