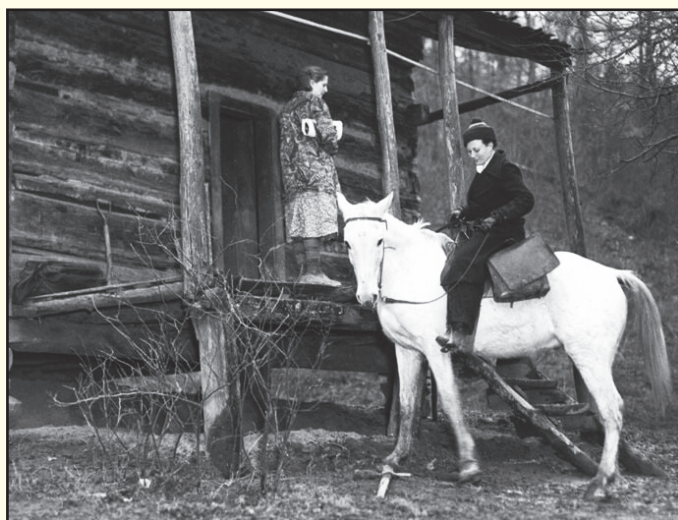

Packhorse Librarians

The Roosevelt era’s Works Progress Administration (WPA) is known for its many huge infrastructure projects and improvements. But it also consisted of a little-known program called the Packhorse Librarians. Jeffrey Urbin of the FDR Presidential Library & Museum explores the story of the Packhorse Librarians, a relatively small group of women, whose mission was to deliver and distribute reading materials to the far-off corners of Appalachia during the darkest hours of the Great Depression. 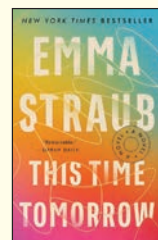

30 Years with Our Director



Can you describe your position in your own words?

When I went to library school, I always figured that I would be a library director at some time. Back then (over 40 years ago), I figured I would find a small community and settle in as an administrator. While the Library District is not unique for a community of this size, it's a much more complex organization than many would think it would be. And it's far from what I had envisioned as my career path those many years ago. The Library District is a business. We have a staff of over 90, we operate three physical locations plus a bookmobile, we have a union, and we are a Civil Service shop. One of my primary jobs is to scan the horizon for both opportunities and challenges and the guide the organization through them. Fortunately, we have an outstanding staff that makes it all work quite well.

What are your goals for your department and/or position?

Having been at the helm for 30 years, one of my goals is to prepare the organization for leadership transition for whenever

that happens. Institutions with long-tenured leadership need to prepare so that those who follow are successful. All of that is more easily said than done, so there is a considerable amount of work to be done. I like my job and I like challenging the staff to think outside the box so we can be as responsive as we can be when providing programs and services to the community. They always rise to the challenge.

What is a fun fact people might not know about you?

I am a marching band fanatic. I grew up in a community that valued that activity. I may not be a fan of where the art has gone but I understand how participation increases personal responsibility and how that relates to being part of a team. I went to the University of Oklahoma for graduate school and had the privilege of being in the Pride of Oklahoma, the University's marching band. Great camaraderie, great football games, and great travel. Boomer Sooner!

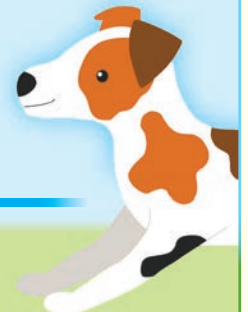

Mary Anning: History’s Greatest Fossilist

In 1799, Mary Anning was born into a humble family in the medieval port

of Lyme Regis on the south shore of England, part of its Jurassic Coast. Little did she know she would go on to develop an unmatched eye for finding the undiscovered creatures embedded in 185 million years of geological history in the notoriously unstable cliffs. Completely self-taught, academia came calling to consult and buy her finds as she continued to make discoveries that changed the scientific world, yet she was unacknowledged and uncredited by the scientific community at that time. “The Lady Doctor Will See You Now”: Early Female Physicians in Poughkeepsie

This presentation is about the lives and works of some female physicians in late 19th and early 20th century Poughkeepsie. Known for its famous nicknames, “Sickly City” and “Queen City,” Poughkeepsie was a source of inspiration as well as a source of possible clients, and as a result it became a very attractive place for women who were practicing medicine to set up shop. Sources include articles and autobiographical pieces by the doctors themselves, personal correspondence, hospital yearly reports, YWCA reports, and newspaper articles of the period. **Registration required.**
