



She-Merchants, Sachems, and Slaves: Women of Colonial New York

Tuesday, October 21, 6:30-8 pm, BRD

New York was one of the most diverse of the thirteen colonies. Racial and religious diversity meant that colliding cultures had different ideas of how to treat women. Learn about women's rights in Munsee, Iroquois, African, Dutch, and English cultures, and how enslaved women's rights changed over time. Learn about women's roles in everyday life, uprisings, and war, and meet some of the outstanding individual women from this period. Presented by Sarah Wassberg Johnson from Philipse Manor Hall Historic Site in Yonkers, NY.

Vicious and Immoral: Homosexuality, the American Revolution, and the Trials of Robert Newburgh: Author Talk with John McCurdy

Wednesday, October 22, 6 pm, Virtual

In *Vicious and Immoral*, historian John McCurdy tells this compelling story of male intimacy and provides an unparalleled glimpse inside eighteenth-century perceptions of same-sex relations.

FDR Library: Franklin and the Founders Thursday, October 23, 7 pm, Virtual

FDR had a keen understanding and great appreciation of the principles upon which this country was founded. Jeffrey Urbin, Education Specialist for the FDR Presidential Library & Museum, explores how he tapped the Founding Fathers for inspiration and guidance as he struggled to save America from economic collapse and the world from Nazi annihilation.

Music with B.E. Farrow of Gangstagrass Saturday, October 25, 2-3 pm, SPD

B.E. Farrow is a musician, educator, songwriter, and researcher who whose work reshapes and reflects America's musical history through stories, creative musical expression through popular/historic musical structures, and inclusive dialog. From touring with Grammy Award winner Dom Flemons, giving talks at the Library Company of Philadelphia, running a music program in Greece with refugees, and currently touring with the Emmy-nominated Gangstagrass, Farrow forms a discipline to understand the unspoken roots of music and explore the impact of expression on cultural history.

Colonial Period Silhouette Workshop

Monday, October 27, 5:30 pm, SPD

During the Colonial period, cut paper portraits were an affordable way to obtain a picture of you or your loved one. In this workshop, we will look at artists and examples of works from the colonial period to the present day, and then create our own using modern technology and scissors.

The Schuyler Sisters and the Hamilton Musical Tuesday, October 28, 6:30-8 pm, ADR

Four daughters of wealthy General Philip Schuyler ran away to elope with rich men. But Elizabeth Schuyler married Alexander Hamilton, a penniless orphan immigrant, for love. We will read the love letters Hamilton sent to Eliza during their courtship, then meet two other women — Angelica Schuyler Church and Maria Reynolds — who were after Alexander. This program features music from *Hamilton*, the Broadway musical. Presenter Rick Feingold teaches American Business History at Bergen Community College.

The Losses and Services of the American Loyalist in Poughkeepsie

Tuesday, November 4, 6 pm, BRD

During the American Revolution, not everyone was a patriot. Poughkeepsie had its mix of patriots, loyalists, and people who simply didn't care either way. Those who decided to remain loyal to the crown were not always treated with the respect they once were. Join historian Shannon Butler as she presents her research on the small but active community of loyalists of Poughkeepsie.

A Promised Land: Jewish Patriots, the American Revolution, and the Birth of Religious Freedom: Author Talk with Adam Jortner

Wednesday, November 5, 7 pm, Virtual

Jews played a critical role both in winning the Revolution and in defining the republic that was created from it. During the war, every city with a synagogue fell to the British except Philadelphia. Jewish patriots throughout the colonies flocked there and refounded the local synagogue as an American organization. After the war, Jews began to press for full citizenship in the hope that liberty would apply to everyone. The Founders, Jewish patriots, and their allies sought and achieved the broadest possible definition of religious liberty, and the separation of church and state.

Liberty and Justice for Whom?: Personal Stories of the Locally Enslaved in the American Revolution

Thursday, November 6, 6 pm, BRD

The promise of liberty, based on the principle that all are created equal, was appealing. But during the Revolution, enslaved men, women, and children in Dutchess County at best found a mixed bag of success and setbacks. Through the stories of five individuals: Sophia Pooley, Andrew Frazier, Jacob Lyle, and two local men named Jack on opposite sides of the war, we come to understand the uncertainty of the American promise for the enslaved.

American Revolution Historic Songs with Cosby Gibson & Tom Staudle

Monday, November 10, 6 pm, BRD

Join Cosby Gibson and Tom Staudle for an evening of historic songs performed with a variety of instruments. The duo will provide a brief narrative and anecdotes of the history of the songs, as well as of the war of American independence.

Spilling the Tea: A History of Tea Drinking in New York State

Thursday, November 13, 6:30-8 pm, Virtual

How did a beverage developed in Asia make its way to the shores of the Hudson River? Learn about the history of tea in colonial New York, from its introduction in Dutch New Netherland to the Tea Act boycotts of the Revolution and beyond. Sarah Wassberg Johnson, program and event manager at Philipse Manor Hall State Historic Site in Yonkers, NY, will lead us on a journey through the global and local history of tea and sugar, all the accoutrements necessary to consume it, and New York's unique role in American tea culture.





Rebellion 1776 by Laurie Halse Anderson


A historical fiction middle-grade adventure about a girl struggling to survive amid a smallpox epidemic, the public's fear of inoculation, and the seething Revolutionary War.

In honor of Jewel and her many contributions to our community and especially to the Big Read, from now on, the flagship author event of each Big Read series will be known as the Jewel Geissinger Ratzlaff Keynote Lecture.


